Funding for town facelift on the horizon

The next stage of the ABC Healthcheck Caterham project will see an Expression of Interest for SEEDA funding form being submitted to the Surrey Rural Towns Group (SRTG) on 19th June. Last year's ABC Healthcheck survey revealed the key issues of concern to local residents, and in recent weeks members of the ABC committee have been putting together a 'wish list' of short-term measures that would smarten up our town, known as the 'Shabby to Smart' initiative. Caterham could poten-

tially receive £100,000 from SEEDA (the South East England Development Agency) with match from Surrey fundina County Council, Tandridge District Council and other supporters doubling the figure to £200,000. If SEEDA approves the bid a more detailed follow up form will need to be com-

piled including proposed timeframes and who will be responsible for monitoring and implementing the project. The second form could be ready for submission during the autumn with a view to works commencing from spring 2009.

Most of the measures to smarten up Caterham would involve highways issues, such as street lighting, railings, signage, flooding and pavements. To explain how SCC Highways funds are managed, the highways officer from Surrey County Council, Derek Poole, met with committee members last month. Derek was able to explain how the Council prioritises its budget spend and therefore which projects could potentially be paid for by Highways and which would need to come out of the SEEDA grant. Derek also advised on safety and other requlations and ongoing main-

New road sign commemorates RAF hero

The name Victor Beamish Avenue has been restored to a historic road in Caterham at an official unveiling ceremony last month.

On Tuesday, 13th May, Councillor Steve Altria performed one of his last official duties as Chairman of Tandridge District Council, by presiding at the ceremony in Caterham-on-the-Hill.

Also present were Cllr. Matthew Groves, Cllr. Hilary Turner and other members of the Parish Council, members of the local Royal Airforce Association (RAFA) and local historian Norman Skinner. Norman first came up with the suggestion that the name of the road that leads to Kenley Airfield should be changed back from Caterham Close to Victor Beamish Avenue.

"I remember this road being named after Group Captain Beamish when I

was an A.T.C. leader after the war," said Norman during the proceedings. "I am very pleased to see the name 'Victor Beamish Avenue' restored to this length of road and I thank everyone for their help. Not wishing in any way to detract from the man we are here to honour, I ask you all to give a moment's thought to the hundreds of men and women of more humble rank who must have passed this very spot with its Guard Room and barrier as they discharged their duties whilst at R.A.F. Kenley."

I can't say too much now but as soon as we have an update I will be sure to let you all know.

I was delighted to see so many of you at the Caterham Valley Parish Council AGM last month. These meetings are vitally important and act as a great way for me to meet members of the community.


The Drugs Bus was out and about in Tandridge last month to support the National Tackling Drugs week. It visited Tescos and Skaterham, Caterham-onthe-Hill, and other prominent places throughout the area. The purpose of the Drugs Bus was to educate, inform and raise awareness of drugs misuse in the community and reiterate the message that



'Drugs Destroy Communities'. Officers from my Safer Neighbourhood team were on board the bus and youngsters had the opportunity to be in with a chance of winning lots of prizes. In addition to the Drugs Bus officers also carried out a number of search warrants in Tandridge which yielded class A and class C drugs, money and other drug paraphernalia. You may have also seen us out in the local public houses working with the licensees to eliminate supply/use within their premises. Surrey Police will not tolerate the supply of illegal drugs and we work closely with partner agencies to prevent misuse, educate the public about the dangers of drugs and where appropriate provide support to those affected by drugs.

Drugs misuse is a community problem and a motivation for committing other crimes to fund the habit. I would encourage anyone with information about drugs to come forward and speak with my officers or Crimestoppers anonymously on 0800 555111.

The Chairman of Tandridge Voluntary Service Council, Mike Moss, held a meeting at the Tandridge District Council offices last month regarding the establishment of a new charitable foundation. The proposed 'Tandridge Community Fund' would be built up over the years to generate interest for charitable purposes in the Tandridge District Council area.

Two years ago the Surrey Community Foundation was set up, which now has a fund of nearly £1m and is starting to issue grants from the interest to charitable groups within Surrey.

"Although there is already a Surrey-wide scheme, the Tandridge Community Fund would assist local charitable groups who would otherwise compete for grants with other groups throughout Surexplained rey," Mike. Wendy Varcoe, the Executive Director of Surrey Community Foundation, attended the meeting to

explain about funds and foundations and endorsed the introduction of a District-wide fund in Tandridge.

Once set up, the Foundation would be seeking donations from local organisations and individuals who would like to help build the initial capital sum. Mike was keen to emphasise that local charities should not lose their support in favour of the Tandridge Community Fund. "We do not want potential donors to stop helping local groups but to consider also helping this Fund because the interest earned will help others," he said. "Once sufficient capital has been accrued to raise the interest, the Management Committee will be in a position to consider requests for donations from local charities." Rose & Young latest

In the April edition of The letter stated: "Please be Caterham Independent we highlighted the plight of the derelict Rose & Young site at 67/69 Croydon Road, Caterham Valley. MP Peter Ainsworth told us that he would write to the owner of the site, Mr O'Riordan of Caterham Proper-Ltd., about the ties situation. In his letter he complained about the 'blot on Caterham's landscape', saying the the site was "unsightly, wasteful and damaging to the town's economic vitality." He asked Mr O'Riordan what his proposals were for the site and the timescales involved.

On May 28th Mr Ainsworth received a reply from a spokesperson for Caterham Properties saying that they are endeavouring to provide a mixed development but to do so they would require relief in relation to the standard parking requirements for office/retail parking. The

assured that we are verv anxious to progress matters and to give the town an attractive building as quickly as possible."

The spokesperson explained that Caterham Properties is not the sole owner of the land. Last year a portion of the land was sold to another company who have since sold part of their acquisition. Both companies have agreed that the best way forward is to work with Caterham Properties Ltd to create a joint development submission to the Council for planning approval on the basis of one building only, with a common street facade. Caterham Properties Ltd are in the process of working with other professionals to progress the planning application and design of the new development. They have stated that they want to provide a good looking building and will not cut costs in doing

New supported living scheme


People with learning disabilities of all ages are being helped to live independently thanks to a new development of eight fully self-contained flats in Whyteleafe Road, Caterham-on-the-Hill.

Surrey County Council is working in partnership with HydeMartlet and Tandridge District Council on the £1.27 million scheme and the decision-making Executive has agreed to offer land at a peppercorn rent to the new supported living project. Planning permission has been given for the eight one-bedroom, wheelchair accessible flats on land next to an existing building that the county council already leases to HydeMartlet. The existing building provides a six-bed residential care home and five supported living flats for people with learning disabilities. There will also be a communal courtvard area between the new and old buildings. To move the £1.27m

scheme forward, the Executive has agreed to grant a 99-year lease on the land from the date the development is completed and to extend the lease of the current building to 99 years as well. A small rent will be paid by HydeMartlet.

Sally Marks, the county council's Executive Member for Adults and Community Care, said: "I fully support this excellent project because it will help people with learning disabilities have the same opportunities as everyone else, allowing greater choice and greater independence.

"Through close partnership working, eight people in Caterham who are currently in residential care will enjoy the greater flexibility that supported living accommodation allows." Building work on the project is expected to start in October this year and it is hoped the new tenants will move in about a year later.

Two weeks later, the cast list was pinned on the Drama Studio doors. Everyone rushed outside as the bell went, to discover whether or not they had been successful. I






Ten wins for Tandridge swimmers

Gun Club members Bob Barrett and Kevin Barrett (who aren't brothers, despite the shared surname) are opening their store for shooting and country sports enthusiasts this month, aptly named Barretts of Caterham. Bob was one of a team of five shooters from the club who set the world record for clay pigeon shooting, while at the same time raising £6,000 for charity. On 27th March 2005 the team broke a total of 4,602 clays out of 5,000, entering the Guinness Book of Records. The highest scorer, Bob, scored an incredible 954 out of 1,000! The Kent Gun Club is situated off the beaten track behind Brands Hatch racing track in very pretty surroundings. After some preliminary instruction on the components of a shotgun and safety procedures, my fellow trainees and I were introduced to 'Down The Line' ('DTL') shooting. DTL shooting consists of five shooters positioned 9ft apart in a 16-vard arc from the trap house that releases the clays. After shooting at five targets each, everyone moves along one place so that you shoot the clays from a different position, until everyone has shot at a total of 25 targets. Under the expert guidance of Bob and other club members, I proudly scored three out of 25, which was about average for our group of beginners.

By the end of the session I was feeling quite comfortable using Bob's record-breaking shotgun, which predictably didn't break any records that dav!





The ancient church of St. Lawrence in Caterham-on-the-Hill has been providing a place of worship for the local community since the 11th century. That tiny hamlet has since grown into a busy town; the High Street was established centuries before the arrival of the railway in 1900 brought entrepreneurial property developers and businessmen to Caterham Valley.

Very few of the very old buildings remain, but Caterham's oldest house, the Grade II listed 16th Century Wildernesse House, still stands close to the magnificent Cedar Tree that marks the start of the High Street. Two more Grade II listed buiildings, no. 33 High Street (built

c. 1760) and Townend Farmhouse (built c. 1672) remain. The rest of the High Street, Townend and Chaldon Road is a mixture of Victorian architecture and more recent structures put up in the 1960's when Caterhamon-the-Hill was rapidly expanding.

The High Street and what is now called The Raglan Precinct areas are now home to 'specialist shops' which bring in regular visitors from outside Caterham. As well as the traditional butchers and greengrocers that still trade on the Hill, you will find outlets like Vivace Pianos, Jam music store and the soon-to-open Barretts of Caterham, suppliers of guns and other sporting goods. Alice Rose Gifts has saved many a trip to Croydon for a last minute birthday present, and Milan Design is worth a visit if you want something stylish for a special occasion.

In the garden

Shrubs in borders are one of the key factors in determining the appearance of a garden. The right selection when replacing a dying or straggly looking bush or filling an empty space will give you pleasure and satisfaction in years to come.

Most shrubs, given the right start initially and a little care later will last for many years and here are some of my favourites:

Choisya ternata – an evergreen shrub whose foliage is usually a lime or light green and contrasts vividly with other greenery around it. Sometimes known as the Mexican orange blossom, it will do well in full sun or partial shade and can be grown on most soils, including clay, as long as it does not become waterlogged. The plant produces small white flowers through late spring

to early summer and will grow naturally into a domed shape bush. It has a distinctive, pleasant fragrance and can be propagated in late summer by semi-ripe cuttings. To me it is one of the most attractive and durable of garden plants.

Viburnum – this shrub has over 100 varieties and can be both evergreen or deciduous.

Whilst it is not possible to detail all varieties, two well worth serious consideration are Viburnum burkwoodii and plicatum. Both are hardy evergreens. Burkwoodii has a bronze like foliage and the older leaves turn a deep red in autumn. It is adorned with white flowers in springtime. Plicatum also has white flowers carried in large flat heads whilst the foliage is a deep green in summer, turning to a reddish tint in autumn. As the branches tend to interlock, the plant often looks as if it is covered in snow when it is in

Finally – tip of the month – one year's seed equals seven years weed!! Keep the weeds under control before they are able to flower and seed – happy gardening!





I write to you on behalf of the Rotary Club of Oxted & Limpsfield to ask you if you would allow us the courtesy of your columns to thank all the generous people of Oxted, Limpsfield, Caterham and others from outside the immediate district who donated to our emergency street collection on Saturday 17th May for victims of the cyclone in Burma and the earthquake in China.

We also thank Tandridge District Council which sanctioned at very short notice this collection and who waived their usual period of notice regarding collections and Messrs Boots and Morrisons for allowing us to be at their premises.

The sum raised in a relatively short space of time was £430.23 to which the Rotary Club has added £620 and this sum will purchase two ShelterBoxes and an Aquabox.

ShelterBoxes provide humanitarian aid worldwide in the form of shelter, warmth and comfort for people displaced by natural and other disasters. An Aquabox provides up to 30,000 litres of purified water.

Aid is sent in uniquely numbered ShelterBoxes each holding a ten-person tent and other essential equipment designed to help an extended family survive for at least six months. The ShelterBox Trust was set up and is administrated by the Rotary Club of Helston and Lizard in Cornwall and is now supported by Rotary Clubs worldwide.

In just over six years the Trust has provided emergency aid for over 500,000 people in more than 40 countries.


Jump for St. John!

The idea of the villages' and Andaman Discoveries' work is to allow a few tourists at a time to discover their unique lives, whilst participating in interesting activities and having the opportunity to volunteer if they wish. What is the human body?

What is the human body? Well it is an amazing organism. It is made up of many different body systems each with a specific function. Body systems support each other and work together to keep us alive and healthy. The better we look after our bodies the better they will serve us, and the more resilient they will be.

The human skeleton consists of many bones, each made up of living tissue that constantly grows and renews itself and marrow in each bone produces most of the body's red blood cells.

Bones can reveal details about your sex, weight, height and even your diet. By eating a balanced diet that is rich in calcium and by taking regular exercise, you reduce the risk of developing bone diseases such as osteoporosis or osteoarthritis later in life. Where two bones meet, a joint is formed and to

enable smooth movement, joints are covered with lubricated cartilage. Some joints, the shoulder for example, have a greater range of movement than others. Bones in less mobile joints, such as the spine, are attached by strong ligaments and generally provide more stability.

Muscles make up about half the weight of the body. All the voluntary movements you make depend on relaxing and contracting your skeletal muscles, so muscles on either side of the body should be in good balance with each other. If not - for example one side of the body is tighter than the other, weakness develops. Muscle imbalance can develop if you always carry heavy bags on one side of your body or sit at an awkward position at a desk.

A common place for imbalance is the lower back but taking regular exercise


