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No quick fix for de Stafford sports hall floor

The sports hall floor at de Stafford Sports Centre in Caterham has had restricted use since February due to a dangerous dip appearing in the floor presenting a health and safety hazard. The dip is the result of a design fault when the building was first constructed in 1998. The scree that should have been 5cms thick was only 3cms thick which means the whole floor will have to be replaced, costing £70,000. The warranty for the work has now expired and although Tandridge Leisure run the facility, de Stafford School are responsible for its maintenance and are therefore liable for the repair costs. Headteacher of de Stafford School, Mrs Caroline Longhurst, said: "The school does not have enough money to fund the repairs to the floor. Any money we receive has to be spent internally leaving nothing for the sports centre. The situation is hugely frustrating. I have every sympathy for the users of the sports hall

and we are making every effort to resolve the problem. However, raising the funds is proving hugely problematic."

Mark Symons, Managing Director of Tandridge Leisure, said: "The sports hall floor needs to be replaced and it is the responsibility of de Stafford School to ensure this happens. We are currently working in partnership with the school to provide alternative methods of payment to resolve this issue as soon as possible. This has included Tandridge Leisure making a proposal to fund the works in exchange for increased public use of the hall and pool, which the school is currently considering."

Mrs Longhurst said: "You have to explore every avenue when in a situation like this. One possibility is to seek sponsorship for the new floor from local individuals and businesses, but we are open to any ideas that would help us get the hall up and running again." 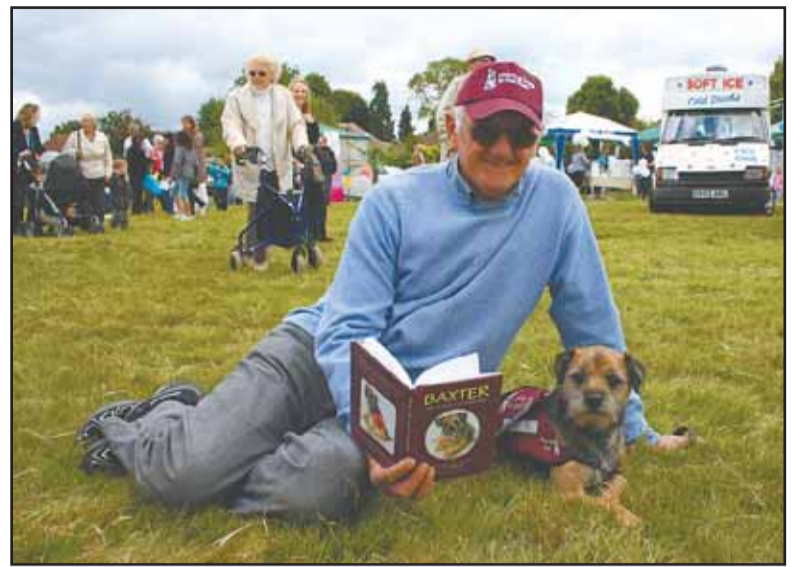
the centre, where she chatted happily with her friends and enjoyed the meal and entertainment laid on by the members of Caterham Rotary Club.

New owners take over the reins at 'The Horseshoe'

The Horseshoe in Warlingham changed hands recently and the new owners have been building on the great reputation this popular restaurant has for delicious home-cooked food. Steaks have been re-introduced to the menu including Ostrich fillet, which was one of the Specials when I visited last week.

The main restaurant area is situated in a large conservatory providing a stylish, light and airy space to enjoy a relaxing evening. The menu offered an excellent choice of traditional meals including lighter bites for lunch-time visits. Our starters were chosen from the menu, but both my son John and I chose Specials from the board for our main

courses.

My starter, 'Prawns in filo pastry', smelt delicious as soon as they were put in front of me and tasted superb in their lovely crispy coating. John chose the 'Mushrooms with Stilton and salad' which he described as: "Full of flavour and perfect as a starter". John, who enjoys his steaks, decided to try the 'Ostrich fillet with peppercorn sauce, creamy potato mash and fresh vegetables'. Cooked medium-rare, John described the meat as: "Lovely! It's like a cross between steak and duck. It's very succulent and different without being outlandish. I'm really glad I've made that choice."

Being a warm summer evening, I fancied a salad and chose another Special, the 'Salmon Nicoise with green beans, tomatoes and new potatoes, egg, chives and a basil dressing."

The salmon was accompanied by a very generous portion of salad that was nice and filling. Despite the great choice of deserts on offer, we both decided to finish the meal with coffee, feeling very full after our two courses.

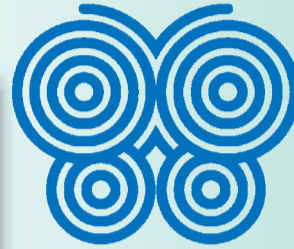

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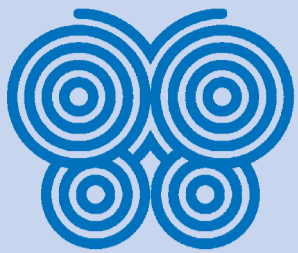
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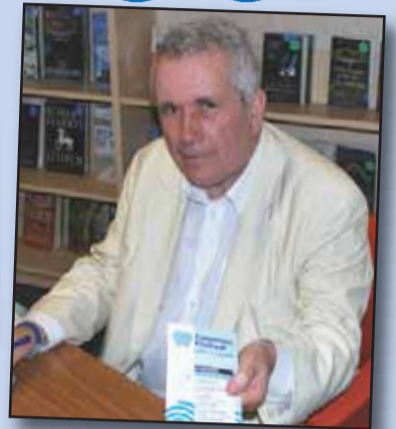
