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

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# Tandridge officers step up patrols after further suspicious incidents

Patrols have been increased and local officers have visited secondary schools following further reports of suspicious incidents involving men approaching young girls in the Tandridge area. The first incident happened at around 7.30pm in Westhall Road, Warlingham, on Thursday, 13th May, when the driver of a small old red car asked a 16-year-old girl to get into his vehicle. The suspect is described as a mixed-race man, aged approximately 35, with short black hair.

On Sunday, 16th May, at 8.45am, a 13-year-old girl was waiting at a bus-stop in Croydon Road, Caterham, when the driver of a blue car asked her to get into the car. The girl said "No" and the man drove off. The suspect on that occasion is described as a black man, aged between 30 and 40 and he spoke with an African accent.

On Thursday, 20th May two separate incidents occurred involving 12-year-old girls. The first happened in Westbury Close, Warlingham, at 4.20pm, when two men in a black Mitsubishi Warrior asked a school-girl to get into the vehicle. One of the suspects is described as a mixed-race man with short hair. Then at 8pm, outside Whyteleafe railway station, the driver of a black 4x4 vehicle waved at a girl and asked her to get into the vehicle. The girl walked to the Whyteleafe Tavern pub where she called her father who collected her. The suspect is described as a mixedrace man with short hair.

Caterham Sergeant Dan Gutierrez said: "All reports are being taken extremely seriously and we are doing an incredible amount of work trying to identify the vehicles used and those responsible for these incidents." 

# Burtenshaw's Beat

Rumour control! According to the rumour mill Caterham Police Station is closing and I am moving to Reigate. This is not true, I am not moving to Reigate. Any move would be within Tandridge where the neighbourhood Inspector should and will be based. Furthermore I would like to reassure you that no decision has been made around Caterham or other police buildings within Tandridge. We will be consulting with the community to ensure provide accessible places for you to meet your local officers. Being co-located with the District Council is not new in Surrey. Neighbourhood teams in Addlestone and Woking already work out of partner offices. It improves the already close working rela-



tionship in tackling local issues. You are probably aware of the murder of a young mum in Nutfield in May. This type of crime is extremely rare for Tandridge; indeed there has not been a murder this century. Detectives are thoroughly investigating this in order to bring the person responsible to justice. Also, since mid-May there have been reports of suspicious incidents of men approaching girls in the Tandridge area. As a result patrols have increased and my officers have been visiting schools to warn the children. If you think you have any information regarding these incidents or see someone

acting suspiciously then please call us.

Good news! I have previously mentioned the CR3 Soldiers, a project started due to dispersal orders on the Hill. At the end of April two CR3 Soldiers, Sophie Aldous and Liam Gillam, attended and ran a stand at a Neighbourhood Conference. All stands were judged and I am delighted to announce they were winners. 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
### 20 years of Rotary 'Reachout'

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### Forged bank note warning

A local resident has asked The Caterham and District Independent newspaper to warn readers to check for forged bank notes when withdrawing money from their local bank. Jon Harrison from Chaldon Road, is being extra vigilant after both he and his son received a forged £20 note from Jon's bank twice in the last eight weeks.

Jon said: "Last Monday I withdrew some cash from over the counter at my branch of Lloyds Bank in Station Avenue. When I got home my wife asked if I had checked the notes, as eight weeks earlier our son had been handed a fake £20 note from the same branch of the bank. He didn't find this out until later, when his landlord paid the money into his bank. As the landlord's bank kept the note he had nothing to go back to Lloyds TSB with. So he lost £20 of hard earned money!"

Jon checked the notes he withdrew on Monday with a special 'Money Tester' pen, only to find that one of the

notes was counterfeit. "I returned to the bank with the counterfeit note which Lloyds replaced for me," said Jon. "When I asked how that could be, a fake note being handed over the counter, the member of staff replied that they do not have time to check all the notes that come in as they have so many."

A spokesperson for Lloyds Bank issued the following statement: "It is standard banking procedure to check all cash that is paid in over the counter to ensure deposits do not contain any forged notes. On top of that, and in line with banking procedures, all banking notes are centrally checked for counterfeits prior to being delivered to the branch for use either at the counter or ATMs.

"We apologise that Mr Harrison received a counterfeit note from one of our counters. We were happy to replace this for him, taking the forged note out of circulation. Unfortunately we are not able to check the note his son believes was counterfeit. If Mr Harrison's son is able to provide evidence that his note was counterfeit from his bank, we will be happy to refund the sum in question to him."


David said: "I wish Tandridge Community Foundation every success with their new venture and Lesley and I are pleased to be

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

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## Property Matters



Here we are with a new government, after election campaigns that were almost silent on housing policy from any of the parties. As we all need somewhere to live and everyone can see that there is an increasing shortage of houses and flats for sale or rent this is disappointing – but not surprising as I cannot remember any real policy over the last twenty years.

At least the futile Home Information Packs have been immediately dispensed with – sympathy for the 3,000 or so trained HIPs inspectors – but what a waste of time and money the packs were. I hope more people will now be inclined to test the market with their properties without having to pay several hundred pounds up front for the privilege.

On the sales side, I have been looking for over three months for somewhere in the Caterham area, and very little has come on to the market in that time. Also the number of properties available for rent has reduced, which has meant that rents have increased by 5-10% during the year in this area.

The immediate prospect on finance is that obtaining a mortgage will still be difficult, but interest rate costs are steady and likely to re-

main so for a couple of years. The banks and building societies – particularly those that we own – need to be encouraged by the government to help more, particularly with first time buyers, as a contribution to society and the economy: and I mean encouraged, not forced in to mistakes, by careful thought and planning.

For investors, buying property to rent out remains a viable long term investment for those with capital. At Martin & Co we hosted a well received forum for investors, with informal contributions from local estate agents, accountants, surveyors and solicitors, earlier in the year. 
