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### **Group gets one step closer** to saving the Soper Hall

Earlier this year Tandridge District Council (TDC) invited interested parties to submit bids to take over the building as an alternative to the council selling the building to property developers. plan by 15th December. A

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The Soper Hall Group's initial bid to develop the building into a multi-activity community centre was considered by TDC's Resources Committee on Thursday, 14th October. The Committee decided to invite the Group to develop its proposal and submit a revised final decision will be made in early January, so the Group is now putting together their plan to run the Soper Hall on behalf of the community.

Soper Hall Group Chairman, Graham Tapley, said: "I am very pleased that we can now progress further with this exciting and worthwhile project. I am keen to see the Soper Hall restored as a real hub for our community for years to come and this is a step in the right direction. This is a community project, and can only succeed with community backing and involvement".

#### Residents celebrate as council unanimously refuses Croydon Road planning application

The viewing gallery at the Council Chamber of Tandridge District Council was packed to bursting on the evening of Thursday, 21st October. More than 80 residents listened to the arguments about the proposed application by property developers, London & Quadrant, for 69 new dwellings on the site of the former Adult Education Centre in Croydon Road, Caterham. After an hour's debate the application was refused unanimously.

Councillor Ingham said: "I am delighted that this proposal has been refused. It was quite clearly too large, too dense and totally out of character with the surrounding area. I am really impressed with the hard work the residents have put into protecting their community from this over-development of 'rabbit hutches'. Not one of the hundreds of letters I have received from residents has complained about develop-

ing the site - we have only got to look at Rose and Young to see what happens to an unused building. But we just don't need this sort of development in Caterham. I really hope the developers will take on board the many objections expressed here this evening and look into providing what Caterham really needs - two and three-bedroom houses." On leaving, the residents were clearly delighted and congratulated all those involved with opposing the application.

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#### Traffic survey shock in Caterham-onthe-Hill

A traffic survey in Caterham-on-the-Hill by the recently formed Action Group to Resist Overdevelopment (AGRO) has left residents reeling at the volume of traffic measured in just eight hours. As part of its mission to collect data relevant to future developments in Caterham-on-the-Hill and Chaldon, the group conducted the traffic count on Monday 18th October at the Clifton Arms roundabout at the junction of Chaldon Road and Coulsdon Road.

Caterham-on-the-Hill Parish Councillor, Mary Mountain, said: "It was so busy. There were a hundred cars every ten minutes on my road alone. This junction appears to be operating at capacity during the morning and evening rush hours."

The final tally for the hours measured was over 8,500 vehicles. The group believes it is not unreasonable to assume that in the other 16 hours another 4,000 vehicles would travel along these roads. Allowing for these volumes to halve at weekends, this gives 75,000 traffic movements a week or nearly four million every year.

District Councillor David Gosling said: "Recent national reports are that traffic volumes are down between 10 and 20 per cent due to the recession, and some local schools were on half-term, so these figures understate the true position. "Any development around this area, e.g. Oaklands House, The Clifton Arms, and the former Aon offices, will have to pay close attention to these alarming statistics. This survey really demonstrates the value of getting first-hand information."

AGRO intend to do further research into traffic volumes as well as the impact that further building development in this area would have both on the community and the environment.

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
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

The house, opened in April 2003, is designed to equip people between the ages of 18 and 45 who have a physical and/or a mild learning disability, with the skills to enable them to move on to the future accommodation and lifestyle of their choice. Diana, who has been a tetraplegic for 35 years, was the inspiration behind the building of the house where residents can stay up to two years.

In 1981 Diana founded the Tandridge Physically Handicapped and Able-Bodied (PHAB) Club. During her time as chairman of PHAB, Diana became concerned for the welfare of some of the club's members.

Diana said: "Some of the people who came to the club lived at home with their elderly parents who cared for them. They were somehow going to have to

learn how to cope on their own after their parents had gone. It made me realise they would need somewhere to live which offered support while they learnt the skills required to live on their own."

The specially-adapted house in The Village, Caterham-on-the-Hill can accommodate five people. Residents are assisted in learning life skills by Housing Support workers during office hours, Monday to Friday. Residents each have their own private room in addition to shared facilities including a kitchen, living room and garden.

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

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
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### A night out at Bollywood


