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CR3 Forum Consultation seeks views of local residents

Over 150 people visited the CR3 Forum event on the Caterham. Chaldon and Whyteleafe Neighbourhood Plan, held on Saturday 5th October at the Soper Hall in Caterham. The event was the first of several to be held over the next year, where a plan is to be created and local residents will be able to provide their own views. At this event, attendees

learned of the current work being carried out and emerging ideas. Six key sectors were covered:

1. Housing: Identifying local housing needs as well as local preference with regard to urban and rural design.

2. Transport: Identifying transport needs and improvements.
 3. Services: Identifying the community needs including health, schools, police and other services.
 4. Leisure: Maintaining exist-

ing leisure activities in addition to improving the area.

5. Business: The health of the town centre areas for retail and other business. Research is being undertaken for a

Business Improvement District (BID) initiative as part of these needs.

6. Utilities: The group is assembling ideas for the next 20 years on utilities such as power, water, gas and telecoms, whilst identifying current improvements that could be made.

The Neighbourhood Plan will contain a number of policies which will affect planning regulations locally, as well as others designed to set overall priorities and directions for the future.

CR3 Forum Chairman Cllr. Geoff Duck said: "This was a great first event where we had a chance to tell people more about this project and the emerging evidence and ideas for the Neighbourhood Plan. There will be a local referendum for everybody to vote on this next October However in the (2014). meantime we plan several more events to provide progress reports and an opportunity for everyone to participate.

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

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Croydon Council rejects controversial plan for a Lidl store in Hamsey Green

On Thursday 24th October Croydon Planning Officers voted to refuse the planning application submitted by Lidl to build a supermarket on the site previously occupied by The Good Companions pub in Hamsey Green. Over 30 local residents and their children went into Croydon to attend the meeting in the Town Hall in Katherine Street. Their major concern was for the likely traffic problems and danger to local schoolchildren the proposed new store would cause.

Speaking against the application were local Croydon Councillor Lynn Hale, the leader of Surrey County Council, David Hodge and campaign leader Paul Redinaton.

After the meeting Paul said: "Despite Croydon's planning team misguidedly recommending approval, the Plan-Committee nina unanimously rejected the plans. It was a victory not only for the local community but for common sense."

Lidl had improved its access and changed the design of the store to try and address the issues raised by local residents at a public consultation before the planning application was submitted. However, at the Planning Meeting it was clear that a big issue was access. The plan to place another junction in the middle of others and close to a bus stop was deemed "unbelieveable" and 'very dangerous". One member

committee said: "We must not allow this to happen".

Paul added: "Hamsey Green doesn't need or want a supermarket, and the traffic and hazards it will bring particularly to the neighbouring schools and their pupils. However, whilst we have won the battle the war isn't over as Lidl can appeal. We will be ready if they do."

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



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Diary of a Plantaholic

The laurels I was resting on last month have been swept up along with everything else! Autumn is in full swing. I am trying to get all the bulbs planted in the next couple of weeks, although it won't hurt if the tulips are left a bit longer, as late planting helps prevent 'tulip fire'. Bulbs, winter bedding (like violas), and highly scented evergreens such as Sarcococca, and Skimmias, are being placed close to the house. They are all in pots. I must remember to cover bulbs with chicken-wire. Even more important is to raise the pots off the ground, either with pot feet or bricks. Waterlogging and cold can kill even the hardiest plants.

Emptying the leaf boxes is well under way. This year we are dismantling the old boxes, made of chickenwire and old pallets. Instead we are going to use



the canvas builders' bags, they will be a lot easier to handle. The leaf mould is definitely worth all the effort, lovely stuff. The majority is being spread on the 'woodland area', which has lost its identity a bit since we had to have lots of branches removed. I am planting some small Acers, as a reward for all my hard work (with Rootgrow, as they won't get a lot of attention down there).

The greenhouse doors are open and the fans have been checked. Only cold air will circulate until a really cold snap, when the doors will be closed and the fans switched to just frost-free, as it is crucial to maintain good ventilation to keep mould at bay.



Enjoy awardwinning cuisine at The Curry Leaf Review by Julia Church

We are fortunate to have a great choice of excellent Indian restaurants in our area and the residents of Old Coulsdon have a real gem in their midst with The Curry Leaf.

Proud winners of Chef of the Year 2012, the excellent food and friendly atmosphere draws customers from near and far.

When my friend Jill and I dined there recently Ali Uddin, the owner, said that their Wednesday Banquet Nights and Sunday Lunch Buffets are especially popular with the customers. The Banquet nights offer a four course meal for £13.50 per person and the Sunday Lunch Buffets offer 'Eat as much as you like' for £8.95 for adults and £4.95 for children.

We dined there on a busy Saturday night when it was full of Despite being customers. busy, we had no trouble having a conversation and we were soon happily chatting away over a bottle of Pinot Grigio and deciding to what to choose from the menu.

To start with Jill chose the Leaf Special Grill, a mixed platter of Sheek Kabab, Chicken Tikka and Lamb Tikka and I chose the Vegetable Pakora. My Pakora was crispy on the outside with lovely, soft vegetables on the inside and I was very pleased with my choice. Jill gave me a taster of the meat in her starter which was tender and spicy.

For our main courses Jill chose Butter Lamb (£7.20) with side dishes of Peshwari Nan and Onion Bhaji.

I decided to have a Birivani curry for a change, and opted for the Prawn Biriyani which came with rice and a separate vegetable curry, all for £9.70 offering excellent value. I could not finish it because it

was so filling! Jill was very impressed with her Butter Lamb and mopped up the creamy butter sauce with her Peshwari Nan with great relish.



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

Several famous people have lived within the Caterham and district area; Charles Asprey the jeweller, Joseph Swan the inventor, Mabel Lucie Attwell the artist and author, Sir Adrian Boult the conductor, Lord Robens the cabinet minister and chairman of the National Coal Board, Sir Karl Popper the philosopher and Roger Hargreaves the creator of the Mr Men books.

Others, lesser known, include Sir George William Paton (1859-1934). He lived in Caterham and was chairman of Bryant & May, the brands included England's Glory and Swan Vestas. Salmons Lane Whyteleafe was the home of the Liberal MP Robert Lowe (1811-1892), later Viscount Sherbrooke. Lowe's political career included, at different times, the positions of Chancellor of the Exchequer and Home Secretary. He was an albino and despite poor vision was an enthusiastic

cyclist, enjoying rides up and down the local hills. Beautiful gardens containing rare plants once graced Well Farm in Whyteleafe, the home of the eminent Sir David Prain (1857-1944), director of Kew Gardens. William Willett Bruce (1862-1953) was the superintendent engineer of the White Star Line between 1904 and 1923. He was the inventor and patentee of a whistle control system used by all the ships of the company from 1908 including Titanic. Bruce lived in Whyteleafe in 1950. Why not research your locality and discover more famous people!

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
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
