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Ready, get set, go! Caterham Rotary Club holds its first ever Half Marathon.

Nearly 200 runners entered the first ever Caterham Rotary Half Marathon held at Redhill Aerodrome on Sunday, 20th July in aid of Shooting Star Chase Children's Hospice Care.

The race was inspired by Rotarian Peter Georgiades, who first thought of holding the half marathon two years ago.

Just before the start of the race Peter, who was himself running the half marathon, said: "Two years ago I was dreaming of hundreds of people taking part in the race and it has at last got off the ground. I am absolutely

thrilled that it has actually happened. When you see what the Rotary Club can put on I am just a small cog in a big wheel."

The weather, warm but overcast, was on the humid side for the race which took place in the beautiful country roads around the Aerodrome. Rotarians acted as marshals and manned water stations along the route which was not closed to traffic during the race.

After the event, one of the organisers, Richard York, thanked all the volunteers who got up early to help on the day and

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said: "We have had some very positive feedback with most adding that they will be back next year. It really was a great team effort."

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Sam Gyimah MP calls for banks to take action on 'vishing'

Sam Gyimah MP has demanded the banking industry do more to protect customers from new types of financial scam such as 'vishing', after a couple from Godstone were defrauded of their life-savings worth \pounds 42,300.

Vishing (Voice phishing) is a type of telephone scam in which victims are deceived into transferring funds to fraudsters posing as representatives of their bank. It exploits a loophole in the telephone system that allows the line to be kept open up to two minutes after the victim believes the call has ended.

Alongside courier scams, vishing is a type of 'mandate fraud' for which the banks refuse to accept liability as the transaction was authorised by the legitimate account holder. After vigorous lobbying by Mr Gyimah, his constituents were eventually reimbursed by their bank, which insisted the move was purely a gesture of goodwill.

The problem is growing, with Financial Fraud Action UK identifying vishing as a key driver for the 14% rise in card ID theft last year, the cost of which increased from £32.2m to £36.7m. Following the case, Mr Gyimah has written to the Chief Executive of the British Bankers Association

to demand banks take action to protect their customers. He has also raised the matter with Andrew Tyrie, Chairman of the House of Commons Treasury Select Committee, and the Committee is considering ways to take this forward.

Mr Gyimah said: "The experience of my constituents and others targeted by this scam is truly horrifying. It could happen to anyone. That is why we need co-ordinated action from the industry to raise awareness of the latest scams and ensure customers are well-informed of the dangers posed by fraudsters."

Don't miss this year's extra-special Battle of Britain Memorial Flight at Kenley!

This year's visit by the Battle of Britain Memorial Flight ('BBMF') to our famous and historic airfield at RAF Kenley on Sunday 17th August will be to commemorate two occasions. Firstly, 'The Hardest Day', during the Battle of Britain on 18th August 1940, in which Kenley suffered heavy losses.

Secondly, the 70th anniversary of the Normandy 'D Day' invasion on 6th June 1944 which, to this day, is the largest military operation in history, codenamed 'Operation Overlord'.

Because of operational requirements, the appearance by BBMF will be in the form of two visits. The first will be a sponsored display by the Spitfire and Hurricane at 11.45am followed by a flypast of the Lancaster at 12.40pm. Some readers may know that the only other airworthy Lan-

caster in the World is privately owned by the Canadian Warplane Heritage Museum and is based at Hamilton, Ontario. Because of the special relationship that Britain and Canada had in the Second World War, the decision was made to fly her 4,000 miles to England in this special 70th anniversay 'D Day' year. Providing all goes well and weather permitting, she will be here for about a month and will accompany BBMF aircraft at selected air displays and flypasts throughout the month of August. One of the venues chosen has been RAF Kenley and

the flypast on the 17th August is a once in a lifetime event. I am sure there won't be a dry eye on the airfield with ten Rolls Royce Merlin engines humming overhead. So let us make these iconic aircraft welcome. Make some noise, whistle and shout and wave like mad!

The grand old lady has an epic 4,000 mile flight to make, so fingers crossed she gets here safely. And please remember if you attend the event, spectators must keep behind the line.

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Warlingham Village commemorates the 100th anniversary of the start of WWI

Almost one hundred years to the day since the start of World War One, the organisers of the 'Warlingham Walks' are inviting people to join them for a walk around Warlingham to see how the village would have looked during 1914.

Walkers should meet at 2.30pm at the Village Hall, opposite The Horseshoe pub, on Sunday 3rd August for the 3.5 mile walk. There will also be a shorter (wheelchair-friendly) walk for those who would prefer it, followed by tea and refreshments in the Village Hall and a 'Then and Now' display of pictures.

The following day, on the 100th anniversary of the start of WWI on Monday 4th August, an Act of Commemoration is being held on The Green at 11pm. To mark 'When the Lamps went out all over Europe'

people are invited to bring a light to be extinguished in a symbolic act of commemoration.

The organisers are holding an event at Warlingham Church Hall before the Act of Commemoration starting at 8.30pm. A talk will be given about the outbreak of war and how Warlingham was affected in the first month of the war. There will also be a local historian explaining the course of history from the assassination of Archduke Franz Ferdinand in Sarajevo on 28th June 1914 to the outbreak of the war. Entrance is £3 and tickets are available from Warlingham Library.

On behalf of the Caterham Team of Churches, St. Luke's Parish Church, Whyteleafe, will be holding a service of commemoration on Monday 4th August at 11am on the 100th anniversary of the start of World War One.

On Sunday 3rd August at 3pm a service is being held in St. John's Church in Old Coulsdon followed by a commemoration service at the War Memorial.

You may remember the Conservatives were planning to increase the Inheritance Tax (IHT) threshold to $\pounds 1m$ if they won the General Election?

Subsequently, the Coalition Government shelved it. But if you are thinking that you are unlikely to be affected by IHT, think again. More and more people are affected by IHT every year. It used to be a tax that was the preserve of the very wealthy, but escalating property values in recent years have put paid to that.

For single people, Inheritance Tax applies at the top rate of 40% to assets worth over £325,000. This threshold is known as the nil rate band. For married couples and civil partnerships the threshold is £650,000. But the higher £650,000 limit only applies when assets are passed between spouses and civil partners and this figure reduces if any money is passed onto any of your benefactors during your lifetime.

There are also other financial implications to consider, particularly if you are a widow, widower or divorcee. And with the threshold remaining unchanged by the coalition government until at least 2015 and subject to further legislation the freeze will be extended up to and including the 2017/2018 tax year, more people could get sucked in as the minimum IHT threshold usually increases at a rate equivalent to at least inflation.

Many people may not understand the implications of IHT and mistakenly believe they are unlikely to be affected by it. Some simple, straight forward advice, especially around successful will writing, is all some people may need to avoid the pitfalls of IHT.

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Oakhall Church serving God and country in the First World War

With the outbreak of the First World War, Caterham was host to huge numbers of soldiers based at the Guards Barracks in Coulsdon Road, Caterham-onthe-Hill. There was considerable overcrowding in touch conditions with tin billet blocks and tents being used to supplement the permanent three storey accommodation buildings.

Oakhall Church, being located in nearby Francis Road, was only a few minutes walk away from the Depot and was opened several nights a week as a social centre where the trainee quardsmen could relax for a short time and perhaps quietly write home. The Oakhall Workers Band endeavoured to make these young men welcome, serving them with tea and other refreshmens out of their own megre rations, at the same time as sharing their

After eight to ten weeks or so of intensive training these young men were drafted to the battle fields of France and Belgium where they faced the risk of injury and death in the terrible conflict which we are remembering started 100 years ago this August.

On Thursday 26th June, over 400 guests attended a surprise retirement party held for the head of Sunnydown School in Caterhamon-the-Hill, Mr Moore Armstrong and his wife Jill. After 34 years of dedicated service, Moore said a fond farewell to the staff, ex-pupils and their families and guests.

When Moore joined Sunnydown in 1982 with his wife and three children, the school was based on the Hog's Back in Guildford. Moore was appointed Deputy Head, teaching English, Art and PE. In 1983 Jill joined the team as a part time English teacher and in 1984 Sunnydown moved to Portley House in Caterham. The young family moved and lived on site, with the children attending the local primary school.

Moore became the Head of Sunnydown in September 1989 and has been in this role ever since. In 1989 the school consisted of 56 pupils, one head teacher, one deputy and 4.5 teachers. Now in 2014 the school has 50 staff members and 83 pupils. During the retirement party, Sunnydown parent, Cathy Long and expupil Matthew Gordon presented emotional speeches on behalf of the



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Diary of a plantaholic

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Even though I have gardened for over 30 years, I am always surprised by just how much plants grow at this time of year. Plant supports put in in April have been reinforced in places where everything threatened to flop in heavy rain, with rolls of green chicken wire. 'Flexi-Tie' which comes in a clear box and stays tangle free has also been really useful. It's brown, so soon becomes invisible, but strong enough tied round the canes to give really good support. With the big plants staying upright, it gives smaller plants underneath a chance to flourish because when they get too 'drawn' they produce less flowers but lots of tender growth which is loved by aphids and the slugs and snails.

With another 'Garden Open' on 23rd and 24th August, I am trying to prepare the garden for this date. Some plants are cut back, others are kept fed with tomato fertiliser, though I am tailing off the Miracle Grow (apart from hanging baskets), as I don't want too much soft growth.

Others are dead-headed. It will

just be luck whether the roses are in flower, but that's what I Hibiscus, am aiming for. Michaelmas daisies, various verbena, rudbeckia and of course the dahlias, should provide a colourful framework. Grasses and foliage plants will hopefully add varied colour and texture and if I've got the timing right, the bulbs I planted earlier will be in bloom. Too much rain or sun will change the growth/ flowering times, making some of the plant combinations different from anticipated, but that's nature.

The tomatoes, cucumbers and peppers are cropping fantastically, but not the aubergines or propagators' lids seem to be keeping the wildlife off, they just look a bit odd but it is worthwhile.

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Eating Out the restaurant.

The Coach House, Godstone -**Continental food** with style

Continental food with style to me sums up the wonderful cuisine at The Coach House restaurant in Godstone.

Not only does the food look good, but it tastes superb as well, prepared in-house by a team of chefs led by Chef de Cuisine, Chris Southon.

When I arrived at the restaurant with my daughter Jenny we were warmly greeted by owner, Corinne Howe, who invited us to have aperitifs with a dish of olives in the lounge while we perused the menu, very relaxing!

Their Fixed Price Menu offers good value for such high quality food and plenty of choice, with two courses for £14.95 and three courses for £19.95. Jenny chose from the Fixed Price Menu and I selected vegetarian options from the A La Carte menu.

A little while later Corinne invited us through to our table in For our starters, Jenny had chosen the Chicken Liver Paté, Grape and Tarragon Chutney and Warm Toast and I chose the Cantaloupe Melon, Cucumber Granita and Blue Cheese (£6.95).

Considering it was the hottest day of the year, my starter was the perfect choice - it was beautifully refreshing because the Cucumber Granita was a wonderful sorbet! When I described my starter as a 'tantalising combination of flavours' Jenny said that she was about to say exactly the same thing about her starter, with the Grape and Tarragon Chutney going very well with the paté. For our main courses Jenny chose the Pulled Braised Leg of Lamb, Crushed Potatoes, Broad Beans and Greens with Rosemary Jus and I chose the Wild Mushroom and Bitter Chocolate Risotto with Lemon Oil (£12.95). Since becoming vegetarian I am becoming quite a risotto connoisseur and this was certainly one of the best I have had. It was gorgeous and creamy and very filling.

Jenny described her lamb as 'very tender and flavoursome'. The bottle of Pino Grigio Blush we ordered went very well with

our meals.

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
Nature Notes

It was the world's gaudiest peanut feeder: the clean tricolour of a woodpecker on one side, offset by the lime yellow and Caribbean blue of a - well, my international parrot book sugaested it was а pale-headed rosella, originally from Australia, and presumably in my garden via someone's empty birdcage. The garden birds didn't seem surprised by their glamorous visitor, although for weeks afterwards I heard starlings mimicking its cheerful call.

That was a decade ago. These days, seeing parrots in Surrey is easier than finding sparrows. Ringnecked parakeets cross the sky in green droves, the latest in a long line of wild species we've either pulled out of the North Downs' natural web or sown in. Like a statue from a mould that is now broken, ecosystems always show hints of the pressures that originally forged them. It was wolves that whittled deer to be so watchful,

even if the foxes that historically scavenged wolfkilled carrion now exploit fast food litter instead. Wildcats, pine martens and red squirrels are only a memory, but rabbits, pheasants, little owls and rats have all hitched a lift with us, joined more recently by grey squirrels and rhododendron. As humanity changes the natural world ever more rapidly, it's hard not to wonder what the common garden visitors will be in a century's time.

The proceeds from the raffle will be donated to 'STUBS' (Support Our Armed Services) military charity.



Distribution of the funds has now ended. Rev Tim Goode of St Luke's Church, Whyteleafe, was involved with organising the appeal. He said;


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
